MISSION

The Trojan Guardian Scholars (TGS) program is committed to supporting current and former foster youth who attend the University of Southern California and to building a regional network that creates new pathways for college-bound students exiting the foster care system. By providing key support services, the Trojan Guardian Scholars program helps enable students who attend the University of Southern California to experience the campus to its fullest and to achieve their goals of academic excellence, self-sufficiency, and successful professional careers in their desired fields.

ON CAMPUS SUPPORT & SERVICES

Trojan Guardian Scholars provides a variety of wraparound support services for students attending USC. TGS as an organization does not provide direct scholarships; however, it does provide support in navigating, obtaining, and maintaining various forms of financial support available to USC students with foster care lived experience. These include:

- Assistance applying for financial aid
- Help identifying and maintaining scholarships
- Budget workshops and financial counseling
- Potential year-round on-campus housing
- Supplemental academic mentoring
- Registration and enrollment assistance
- Referrals to health and counseling services
- Internship, fellowship, and career counseling
- Peer mentoring and student programming
- Cohort social events and holiday dinners

Background & History

Founder

Trojan Guardian Scholars (TGS) was co-founded in 2013 by Wendy Smith, PhD, retired clinical associate professor and associate dean of faculty development at the [USC Suzanne Dworak-Peck School of Social Work](#). She has dedicated her career to providing opportunities for young adults transitioning out of the foster care system and designed the school's first course on transition-age foster youth. She authored the [first comprehensive text](#) to focus on youth emerging from care, and integrated multidisciplinary research into practice providing a new foundation for those who work with former foster youth.

A New Home in Social Work

In May of 2022, [Sara Jimenez McSweyn](#), LCSW, senior lecturer at the USC Suzanne Dworak-Peck School of Social Work, took over the reins of the Trojan Guardian Scholars (TGS) program as it [moved to its new home](#) at the school. Formerly under the auspices of the USC Dornsife College of Letters, Arts and Sciences, the TGS program continues to provide resources, guidance, and a supportive community to any current or former foster youth who is a student at the University of Southern California.

Jimenez McSweyn has revised the TGS program into three tiers: students with the greatest level of need or in crisis; students who are relatively stable, but need occasional help; and students who have developed their own systems of support at the university but want to

engage in some activities or events within the program. Jimenez McSweyn stressed that those in the third tier are still welcome to seek any assistance they may need.

To further the visibility of the program and provide TGS students with a space to address their needs, the Trojan Guardian Scholars Center was created. Housed within the Montgomery Ross Fisher building of USC Social Work, the center provides a physical meeting place for this community.

Practicum Experience

Beth Lucas, MSW '98, serves as the instructor for MSW students placed within TGS, and has played a key role in ensuring the MSW placement remains aligned with the mission of TGS. She has worked closely with Wendy Smith Meyer for many years shepherding and guiding the work of the TGS program at USC. Practicum experience is the bedrock of social work practice, and Lucas' keen skill sets are a crucial element of the TGS program's work. MSW practicum student, Edward Ramirez, whose specialization is in children, youth and families, came on board in the fall of 2023, and Jimenez McSweyn says Ramirez has been instrumental in helping the program to mobilize its resources in the service of our student community. More students are reaching out and enrolling, community events are being organized, and assistance with securing emergency financial support for students in crisis continues to be offered.

The TGS program currently serves a total of 32 enrolled students. This represents 80% of the 40-student population identified by USC Financial Aid as eligible for the program.

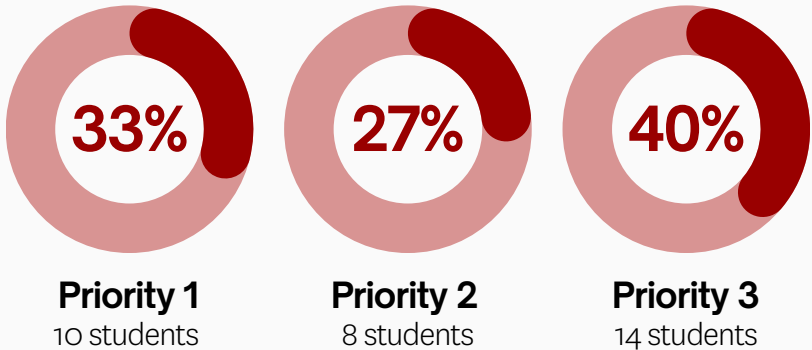
Trojan Guardian Scholars Priority Needs Assessment

Student Needs Categories

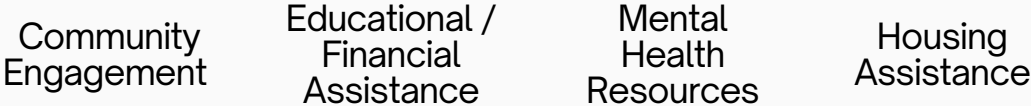
Priority 1: students with the greatest level of need or in crisis

Priority 2: students who are relatively stable, but need occasional help

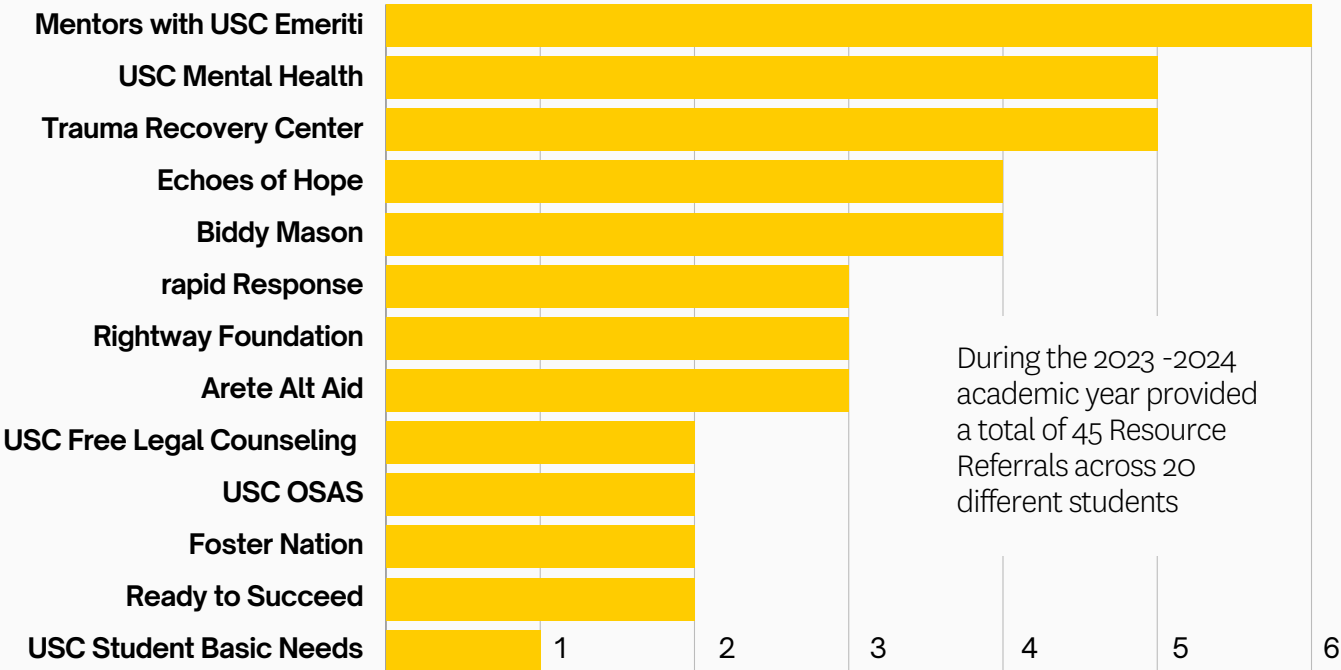
Priority 3: students who have developed their own systems of support at the university but want to engage in some activities or events within the program.

By providing essential resources, organizing various programs and events, and fostering a supportive community, TGS has positively impacted the lives of its enrolled students. The program continues to make a difference in the educational journey of these students, ensuring their success and well-being at the University of Southern California.

> Trojan Guardian Scholars Student Orientation/Welcome

At the start of the Fall 2023 semester, the program organized an orientation/welcome event to introduce new students to the TGS community and provide them with the necessary information and support for a successful academic journey.

> Monthly Trojan Guardian Scholars Student Community Events

Throughout the Fall and Spring semesters, monthly community events were organized for TGS students. These events aimed to foster a sense of belonging and connection among the students, providing them with opportunities to engage and build relationships within the TGS community.

> Holiday Celebrations

The TGS program organized various holiday celebrations to ensure that students feel supported and included during special occasions. These celebrations included Thanksgiving, December holidays, and an end-of- academic-year celebration/debrief at the conclusion of the Spring semester.

> Graduation Gala

A highlight of the reporting period was the Graduation Gala, which honored six Trojan Guardian Scholars students, and their families and friends, who graduated from USC in 2024. This event recognized the achievements of these students and celebrated their successful completion of their academic journey.

> Event Participation

Throughout the reporting period, the TGS program witnessed active participation from its student population; an average of 12 to 15 Trojan Guardian Scholars students attended monthly community events and holiday celebrations, fostering a strong sense of community and engagement.

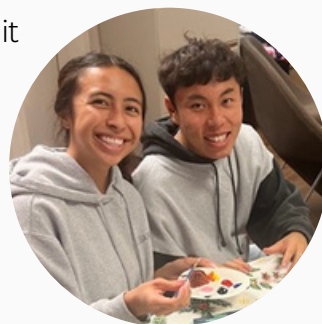


Anonymous Student Testimonies
